Dear Parents, Caregivers & Whānau,

Welcome, Nau mai, Haere mai! hello, As-salām 'alaykum, Namaste, Nǐ hǎo, Chào bạn, Musta, Noa'ia, Hola, Mauri, Ni sa bula vinaka, Fakaalofa lahi atu, Mālō e lelei, Mālō nī, Talofa lava, and Kia orana.

<u>WELCOME BACK:</u> Welcome back to all our families. We hope you had an opportunity to enjoy having the break in school routine over the last two weeks. Term 3 is a fully focused learning term where we see a lot of growth in learning by the children. We see the consistent delivery of the previous terms showing through. Across the school we have a number of events, so please remember to look on the school website parent calendar for upcoming events that may include your tamariki.

SCIENCE TERM: This term has a special focus on science. Across the school, students will be carrying out hands-on, practical science investigations and experiences. We want science to be 'hands-on', engaging, and relatable to the students. In week 8, Wednesday 17th September we have our special parent and whānau science afternoon, so please think about noting this in your diary.

Our Puhinui curriculum essence statement describes science as:

- Puhinui Science fosters a sense of awe and wonder for children in the world all around them.
- Tamariki are scientists who are actively encouraged to explore, question, and test their theories scientifically.
- Students learn to express their own insights and thinking in a scientific manner.

MIHI WHAKATAU: Each term we welcome new whānau, tamariki and teachers to Puhinui School at our mihi whakatau. This will be held tomorrow morning at 9 a.m. Parents of new students should have received an invitation letter earlier this week. We would love to see you if you are able to attend.

It is also a great chance to walk, relax and enjoy the opportunity to talk to your children.

We hope you enjoyed the opportunity to meet with your child's teacher and learn about how they are going and where to next for them in Term 3.
